Majority of the children will take the SATs in the Year 6 classroom.

Some children will have different arrangements, such as having extra time, a reader or a scribe; these children will take the tests in separate rooms with different adults.

The key stage 2 tests will be taken on set dates unless your child is absent, in which case they may be able to take them up to 5 school days afterwards.

### Specific arrangements for SATs

Children with additional needs, who have similar provision in their day-to-day learning at school, may be allocated specific arrangements, including:

- Additional (extra) time;
- Tests being opened early to be modified;
  - An adult to read for them;
  - An adult to scribe (write) for them;
- Written or spoken translations of the mathematics reasoning papers;
  - The use of prompts or rest breaks.

If your child needs different arrangements, myself or Miss Rennie will speak to you about this in due course.

After taking the SATs, children receive a raw and a scaled score. Their raw score is the actual number of marks they get and this will be translated into a scaled score.

This helps to allow for differences in the difficulty of the tests from year to year so that pupils' results can be compared accurately.

In KS2, the test papers are marked externally, with no teacher assessment involved (unlike in Year 2 where the tests were marked by the teacher and the scores used as part of their teacher assessment).

The range of scaled scores available for each KS2 test ranges from 80, the lowest possible scaled score, to 120, the highest possible scaled score.

A scaled score of 100 or more means that the child has met the expected standard in each KS2 SATs test; a scaled score of 99 or less means they haven't reached the government-expected standard.

When the results are released, you will receive the scaled scores and a confirmation of whether or not the national standard has been achieved. Results will be given as either 'expected standard met' or 'has not met'.

# Key Stage 2 GPaS

The grammar, punctuation and spelling test consists of two parts: a longer test paper requiring short answers, lasting 45 minutes, and a spelling test of 20 words, lasting around 15 minutes.

Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling is made up of two papers which will take place on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May:

- Paper 1 is the longer paper lasting 45 minutes, children will be tested on grammar and punctuation and spelling generally;
- Paper 2 is a shorter paper lasting 15 minutes, where children will be tested on spelling only they are asked to fill in a blank within a sentence, attempting to spell out the spelling word in context correctly.

# **Key Stage 2 Reading**

The reading test is a single paper with questions based on three different passages of text, which are not linked. These could be any combination of non-fiction, fiction and/or poetry. Children have one hour, including reading time, to complete the test.

The Year 6 Reading SATs paper requires a range of answering styles, including responding to multiple choice questions, one-word answers, and multiple mark questions which require more formal paragraph-length answers.

# The Reading paper focuses on the following areas known as content domains:

- 2a) give/explain the meaning of words in context;
- 2b) retrieve and record information/identify key details from fiction and non-fiction;
  - 2c) summarise main ideas from more than one paragraph;
  - 2d) make inferences from the text/explain and justify inferences with evidence from the text;
- 2e) predict what might happen from details stated and implied;
- 2f) identify/explain how information/content is related and contributes to meaning as a whole;
- 2g) identify/explain how meaning is enhanced through choice of words and phrases;
   2h) make comparisons within the text.

Two of the biggest changes (and challenges!) over the past few years have been the increase in word count and the emphasis on vocabulary questions, where children need to know and understand the meanings of complex vocabulary (or be able to work it out in context).

Since the current testing format for the SATs began in 2016, there has been a tendency for the number of marks to go in favour towards three particular types of content domain / questions.

#### In 2019:

- 20% of marks could be gained by answering questions where children had to give/explain the meaning of words in context (Content Domain 2a);
- Over a quarter of marks could be gained by answering questions where children had to retrieve/record information or details from the texts (2b);
- Almost half of the marks were allotted to questions requiring children to make inferences from a text, justifying inferences with text evidence (2d).

# **Key Stage 2 Maths**

There are three maths tests.

Paper 1: Arithmetic (30 minutes / 40 marks)

Paper 2 & Paper 3: Reasoning (40 minutes / 35 marks each)

### **Arithmetic**


Maths Paper 1 (Arithmetic) will take place on Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> May.

It covers the four operations (division, multiplication, addition, subtraction and mixed operation calculations requiring BIDMAS), as well as number properties, calculating percentages of amounts, calculations using decimals, and calculations using fractions.

# Reasoning

The first reasoning paper will also take place on Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> May, and the second will be on Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> May.

This test could cover any area of maths taught throughout Key Stage 2.





### Common Errors

- Missing out the correct unit of measurement in the answer
- General presentation final answer not being clear
- Numbers not clearly formed e.g. '0' looking like a '6'
- Decimal points missing them out or making them look like a comma
- 2 step problems make sure children follow the whole question through
- Recording the monetary values incorrectly e.g. must be £8.90 not £8.9

During SATs week, we will be running our SATs breakfast for the children.

Year 6 are invited to come into school at 8am each day and have breakfast with their friends in the classroom.

We find that this usually helps to create a calm atmosphere and helps to avoid children becoming worried about sitting the tests.
