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Message from Mr Kilbride

A busy newsletter today with lots to talk about.

Firstly, school dinners. It has been very frustrating to have a cold packed-lunch only service in recent weeks — this has gone on for too long now. There are two issues here — number one is that the kitchen air extraction unit at Downsview (who cook our meals for us) is broken. There has been a delay in Kent County Council approving the works to fix this problem. I have spoken with the headteacher at Downsview this week and they are doing everything they can to lean on KCC to get this fixed. We understand that once the contractor has been approved the job will take 2-3 days — so I would hope that things may return normal in the next couple of weeks — I will update you when I get more information.

The second problem is that the school meals provider - Chandco — have been unable to maintain a hot service brought over from another kitchen. I have contacted them this week as well, to let them know how disappointing it has been that this has been allowed to go on for such a long time. I am expecting an update from their Account Director today regarding the possibility of restarting hot meals, even prior to the Downsview works being complete. 

High Firs Primary School FOCUS ON: Design & Technology

What is DT?	Quick Quiz – only one of these is always true (answer below)		
	DT and Art are different from each other because: Ceri says: Art is 2D and DT is 3D Bob says: In art you create things that look appealing and in DT you create things that achieve a purpose Kieron says: You paint in art but not in DT		
How much DT we do	DT often shares a timetable slot with art — so children will usually do one term of art followed by a term of DT — once a week. This means children will do three DT projects each school year. Sometimes, the practical making side of DT will be blocked together over one or two school days — saving time on setting up and clearing away.		
How we teach DT	DT projects are taught over several distinct steps: deconstruction of existing product exploration of materials, flavours and textures and joining methods construction of prototype joins and mechanisms design brief design construction evaluation		
This year's focus	In this school year, in all year groups, we are aiming to help the children retain their new knowledge through accurate use of DT related vocabulary and through regular opportunities created to recall prior learning and relate prior learning to current project.		





In Reception, the children prepare for DT further up the school by exploring a variety of materials, tools and techniques, experimenting with colour, design, texture, form and function. This year so far, children have created their own wands using sticks found in forest school and decorating them with ribbons, glitter and other enticing media. The woods was also the inspiration for Reception's beautiful Autumn crowns.

For Year 1's project on freestanding structures the children designed and made castles using measuring,






cutting, sticking with sellotape and sticking with glue. To help with the evaluations, the children

commented on features in other work that they admired.

Year 3 were introduced to mechanical systems through a study of levers and linkages. The children used fixed and loose pivots to design and



make their Christmas cards with moving parts.



Year 4's textiles unit focussed on creating Tudor purses using their own paper patterns, then cutting out fabric, embroidering decorations and tacking pieces together with a running stitch, before completing the strong join using a blanket stitch.

Year 5 were introduced to pulleys and to design and make a fairground ride. rotating pulley wheel move another learned that you can speed up and slow wheels and they now understand the make both pulley wheels turn.
